Christmas Luncheon to Include plein air Art and Poetry by the State's Poet Laureate

The 2006 celebration of the Yuletime season at the Cen-

ter will center once again on the annual members and friends noon luncheon in the Commons and will be preceded by a mid-morning gallery talk by South Dakota's leading plein air painter. Beginning at 10:30 AM in the Fantle Building, Poet Laureate David Allan Evans will sign copies of his newest book, and artist Nancyjane Huehl will lead guests through a review of the pieces in her show "On Paper and Canvas."

Sharing the morning sunlight in the Fantle Building will be David Allan Evans, who will sign copies of his newest book and will read selections as well as talk about his writing following the twelve noon luncheon in the 3in-1 Room. 27th Annual Artists of the Plains Art Show and Sale to be Held Downtown on February 16, 17, 18

Local and regional artists will again be featured during the 27th annual Artists of the Plains Art Show and Sale sponsored by the Center for Western Studies.

The show will be held **February 16-18, 2007**, at the Holiday Inn City Centre, 100 W. 8th Street, downtown Sioux Falls. Due to renovation at the Radisson Encore Hotel, the venue for the show for the last nine years, the International Room at the Holiday Inn City Centre was selected as the 2007 location.

"With a larger room for the show, we are able to invite more artists," Paul Krueger, Director of Development, said. "We will have up to 25 artists displaying and selling their art this year, which we are excited about."

The Premier Showing and Reception is **Friday, February 16, from 7:00 to 9:30 p.m.** with the awards program at 8:00 p.m. Awards include "Best of Show" and "People's Choice" Awards for a painting and a three-dimensional piece. The show is also open **Saturday, February 17, from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.** and **Sunday, February 18, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.** The event is free and open to the public.

The silent auction, which features work by the artists, will be open for bids until 2:00 p.m. on Sunday.

Artists have until December 1 to submit an interest form. The Art Committee is meeting December 5 to select the artists to invite. Results Radio is again the overall sponsor for the event. Businesses interested in purchasing an ad for the program may contact Paul Krueger by calling 274-4007.

"We are looking forward to another successful show and encourage you to make plans now to attend," Krueger said.

The Artists of the Plains Art Show and Sale is the longest running show of its kind in Sioux Falls.

Krueger Joins Staff as Director of Development



A familiar face to the Augustana campus has joined the Center's staff as Director of Development. Paul Krueger, a 1997 Augustana graduate and former Director of Alumni Relations, started at the Center August 28. He replaces Dean Schueler who retired in July.

"I feel privileged to join the CWS staff," Paul said. "In many ways, I believe the Center is a hidden jewel in the Sioux Falls area. One

of my goals is to reach out to the campus community and Sioux Falls area to tell the story of the Center. I believe many people will be surprised by what a wonderful resource the Center is or be enlightened by our many offerings."

Paul comes to CWS after serving the last two years as Assistant Director of the University of South Dakota Alumni Association in Vermillion, SD. Among many responsibilities at USD, he edited *The South Dakotan* and the School of Medicine's magazine. He also managed alumni programs of the Alumni Association and the School of Medicine, the alumni website, the benefits and membership program and planned alumni events across the country. From 1997 to 2000 he was Associate Director of Alumni Relations at Augustana where his responsibilities included overseeing the annual fund and phonathon campaigns. Krueger became Director of Alumni Relations in 2000 and was responsible for the class agent program, alumni events and reunions, Viking Days, the Alumni Council, Friends of Augustana, and the Augustana Academy Alumni Council and reunion. He was also instrumental in assisting with tours of the Augustana Choir and Band.

As a student, Paul served as student body vice president his junior year and as president his senior year. He holds a B.A. in journalism and communications from Augustana College and an M.S. in administrative studies from the University of South Dakota. Paul has served as a board member and chair of the Sioux Empire Red Cross Board of Directors and as a deacon at Heartland Community Church.

Paul's wife Joni became Augustana's Registrar in August. They have a daughter, Emily, 3, and a son, Matthew, 1.

Award of Merit Presented to CWS in Phoenix

Several Center members gathered at the Hyatt Regency Hotel on September 16 to witness the presentation to the Center by the AASLH of the Award of Merit for the publication of *A New South Dakota History*, edited by Harry Thompson and written by sixteen specialists in the history of the state. CWS members in attendance were Robin Coon and Lois Sanchez, from Tucson, and Nancy Nelson and Roger Ziegler, from Prescott.

The Leadership in History Awards Program, sponsored since 1945 by the American Association for State and Local History, conferred 85 national awards at the Phoenix convention, honoring people, projects, exhibits, organizations, and books. The Awards program represents a year-long effort by a national committee comprised of representatives from each region. Each state has its own chair, who seeks out the best projects in his or her state for recognition. The Award of Merit is the first such recognition that the Center for Western Studies has received.

CWS Service to Augustana College

New Law Provides Incentive for IRA Gifts

The Pension Protection Act of 2006 (H.R. 4) was signed into law in August of this year. Under the new law, donors aged 70 1/2 or older will be able to transfer distributions from their IRAs to qualified charitable organizations such as the Center for Western Studies at Augustana College. Your charitable distributions count toward your annual, required minimum distributions. Because nearly two-thirds of American taxpayers claim the standard deduction, this opportunity may be ideal for you. Gifts are limited to \$100,000 each calendar year. This law remains in effect for the remaining tax year 2006 and until December 31, 2007. Seize this opportunity and contact Paul Krueger, Director of Development, at (605) 274-4007 for assistance.

The galleries and permanent exhibits are open to the public Monday-Friday from8:00a.m.tonoon and 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. and Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Permanent collections include the Fantle Scandinavian Room, the Froiland Plains Indian Room, the Jim Savage Art



Studio, and the Augustana Academy Room. We encourage groups to call ahead.

Nancyjane Huehl's exhibit, "On Paper and Canvas: A Collection of Sketchbooks and Paintings" opened September 16 in our galleries with an opening reception and talk on September 19. Many of the pieces are for sale. We are grateful to Huehl for donating 40 percent of each painting sold back to the Center. She will present a final gallery talk on **Saturday, December 2, at 10:30 a.m.** in the Fantle Building during the Christmas Open House. Her exhibit continues through **December 31**.

Our first show of 2007 is **Paul Horsted's** exhibit, **"The Black Hills Yesterday & Today: Rephotographing Historic Photo Sites."** The show opens **January 9** with a reception and gallery talk on **Wednesday, January 10, from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m.** The talk will be at 5:00 p.m. The exhibit features "then and now" photographs of the Black Hills featured in his new book.

Horsted has been photographing South Dakota's people and places for the past two decades. Early in his career, he was a photographer at the Sioux Falls *Argus Leader*, and later served as Chief Photographer at the South Dakota Department of Tourism. Now living in Custer, Horsted works as a book publisher and freelance photographer; his photographs have appeared in such magazines as *Smithsonian*, *Reader's Digest, National Geographic*, and *LIFE*, and he is featured regularly in *South Dakota Magazine*.

Horsted is well known as the co-author (with Ernest Grafe) of the award-winning book *Exploring With Custer: The 1874 Black Hills Expedition.* Horsted re-photographed nearly 50 locations where photos were taken in 1874 during the Expedition, the first large-scale exploration of the Black Hills. The photo pairs from "then and now" show amazing changes, and surprising similarities, in the Black Hills environment over the past 130 plus years.

Following up on this earlier work, Horsted has worked for the past three years to search out the sites of dozens more historic photos made from 1875-1935 in the Black Hills. These "then and now" images show nearly every town in the region, as well as landmarks such as Harney Peak, Custer State Park, Mt. Rushmore, and Spearfish Canyon. The results of this project have been published in a new book entitled *The Black Hills Yesterday & Today*. The book was just released in October and is available in the Center's gift shop. Horsted will be available to sign books at the opening reception on January 10 and during

> the autograph party at the Dakota Conference on April 21. Photographs will also be for sale with a portion of the proceeds supporting the Center.

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Dakota Conference Awarded Grants

The April 20-21, 2007 Dakota Conference has been awarded grants by the South Dakota Humanities Council, an affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Augustana College Mellon Fund Committee. The theme of the thirty-ninth annual con-

ference is "Railroading the Plains." It will examine the history of railroads on the Plains, paying particular attention to the connection between railroads and indigenous people.

The conference recognizes that perhaps no technology has had a more significant impact on the Great Plains than the railroad. Often credited with "opening up" the Great Plains to Euro-American settlement and agriculture, the railroad must also be viewed as a conduit of fundamental change for traditional Plains Indian life.

The marketing of the Plains to immigrants by railroad companies, the decline of the buffalo herds on which



traditional Plains Indian culture relied, and the reorganization of Indian communities onto reservations—all are interrelated.

Proposals for papers and sessions addressing the theme of railroads on the Plains are welcome, as are papers on other topics relating to the northern Great Plains. Paper titles should be sent to Dakota Conference Director Harry Thompson at CWS.

Plenary session speakers include Dr. Don L. Hofsommer, noted railroad historian and Professor of History at St. Cloud State University, and Charmaine White Face, Oglala Sioux author and founder of Defenders of the Black Hills. Hofsommer's most recent books include *Steel Trails of Hawkeyeland: Iowa's Railroad Experience*, for which he won an Award of Merit from the American Association for State and Local History, and *The Tootin' Louie: A History of the Minneapolis & St. Louis Railway.*

A special panel dis-

cussion will take up the topic of railroads in contemporary life. Panelists include Charmaine White Face, who has joined with West River ranchers to express opposition to railroads across grazing areas and tribal lands, and Dr. Rex C. Myers, a historian at Northwest College, located in the Powder River Basin area of Wyoming. Representatives of the Dakota, Minnesota & Eastern Railroad will also be invited to participate in the panel discussion.

CWS member and long-time Augustana College Director of Career Counseling and Placement **Doug Noteboom** was among the first five inductees to the South Dakota Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation's Hall of Fame. **Noteboom** has been a leader in promoting conservation, youth scholarships, habitat improvement, and Youth events in his fourteen years of volunteer work for the Federation.

A long-time CWS Board member received an unusual honor this spring. In recognition of the life of service of the late **Mary Jo Wegner**, who also chaired the Board for three years, **Karl Wegner** and family gave \$1 million to the Sioux Falls Area community Foundation, which has used the money to establish an arboretum in her name. The Mary Jo Wegner Arboretum, dedicated on April 28 along the Sioux River east of Sioux Falls, is located where Mary Jo often took walks.

ED Art Huseboe spoke to the South Sioux Kiwanis Club on October 12 and the Dakotah Corral of Westerners on November 6, about Sioux Falls' founding father Frank Pettigrew. Among the myths exploded: In Territorial Days, some believe, Sioux Falls foolishly chose to have the Penitentiary rather than the University located here. The truth: Vermillion was too strongly represented in the Legislature to change the University's location, but Pettigrew had little trouble in moving the Pen from little Bon Homme to Sioux Falls. A side note: **Huseboe** recently received word that he will be included in the 2007 edition of *Who's Who in America*. It will be the 20th consecutive time that he has been listed in that directory.

On October 19, the Center hosted an open house in honor of long-time members **Lee and Ardis Lillehaug**, who have moved from Sioux Falls to Minneapolis. More than 150 friends joined the Lillehaugs to bid them farewell. ED **Art Huseboe** read a citation, honoring Dr. **Lillehaug** for his exemplary support of the Center over the years, serving as conductor and music director for a series of five dinner-theater events produced by

> the Center. Starting in 1993 with "Music Marches West," in which **Lillehaug** conducted Col. Custer's 7th Cavalry Band, and ending in 2006, with "150 Candles," in which he conducted the Sioux Falls Sesquicentennial Band, **Dr. Lillehaug** voluntarily assembled the musical forces required, chose the music, rehearsed the musical groups, and then presented polished, lively, entertaining performances. The Center was honored in turn to be able to recognize in this way one of its outstanding volunteers!

Sioux Falls artist Stuart Brings

Plenty brought back to town one of the top prizes from the Santa Fe, NM, Indian art show in August. His color pencil drawing titled "Chief Sitting Bull's Vision" won a second place red ribbon in the Class III (Drawing) competition sponsored by the Southwestern Association for Indian Arts on August 19 and 20. The judges were Mike Romero, Barry McCuan, and Michael Vigil. **Brings Plenty** was co-sponsored by businessman **Al Schock** and the Center for Western Studies.
