The Center's challenge grant has been given a "We the People" designation by the NEH, which recognizes the Center's efforts to strengthen the teaching, study, and understanding of American history and culture.



The mission of the Center for Western Studies is Preserving and Interpreting the History and Cultures of the Northern Plains.

Since 1970, the Center for Western Studies has been an important resource in the region. As an archives, research library, museum, and South Dakota's largest academic press, the Center is dedicated to serving Augustana College and the surrounding area. The Center's educational programs attract students, faculty, researchers, and visitors from across the region and nation. The Center's \$3.3 million 22,000 square-foot Fantle Building opened in 2001, and the facility has enabled the Center to triple its capacity for the archives and library. It has also provided permanent space for educational exhibits and displays.

CWS Endowment Campaign

By increasing its' endowment, the Center for Western Studies will continue to be a key resource for researchers; its educational programs related to the Northern Plains will be strengthened and new opportunities for outreach to the College, community and region will be established.

Gifts to the Center's endowment are gifts for the future and for today. The principal of the gift will remain untouched in perpetuity while a portion of the income generated from the principal will provide annual support for key programs.

This campaign will essentially double the Center's operating endowment and is part of the College's \$120 million Momentum Augustana campaign.

The Center's \$1.2 million endowment campaign has been greatly enhanced by a \$300,000, 4:1 challenge grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Endowment Campaign Goals

The goal of the endowment campaign is to create ongoing funds to support the Center's Archives and Library program; the annual Dakota Conference on the Northern Plains; Art Programs and Exhibits; and the Publications Program. A successful campaign will also increase the Fantle Building Fund significantly. The endowment funds will strengthen the programs and allow the Center to rely less upon annual support for these important program areas.

Archives & Library Program

\$ 250,000

To provide support for the purchase of new books about the region, to maintain current journal subscriptions, and to support the ongoing costs of managing an archive.

Art Program & Educational Exhibits \$ 250,000

To support the Center's permanent exhibits, Artists of the Plains Art Show & Sale, permanent art collection, and gallery exhibits.

Dakota Conference Program

\$ 250,000

To support the annual national history conference on the Northern Plains which attracts 300 participants nationwide each year and focuses on contemporary as well as historical issues.

Publications Program

\$ 250,000

As South Dakota's largest academic press, the Center has published more than 75 books. This endowment will create seed money for publishing projects, enabling the Center to begin projects in advance.

Fantle Building Fund

\$ 150,000

This amount will increase the building fund, allowing for upkeep and maintenance of the Center's home for years to come.
